Public-Private Partnership in Public Health, Maternal & Child Health

UPNG School of Medicine and Health Sciences (SMHS)

- 1960 Papuan Medical College established as training center for all cadre of health professionals
- 1967 – First medical students enrolled. The Papuan Medical College became the Faculty of Medicine of UPNG.
- 1990's – UPNG became the School of Medicine and Health Sciences
 - Now with 7 divisions: Public Health, Basic Medical Sciences, Pathology, Clinical Sciences, Dentistry, Health Sciences and Nursing

UPNG SMHS

- **Objective**

- The SMHS will increase its intake of medical students and other categories of health workers over the next 5 to 10 years while maintaining a high quality learning environment with a special emphasis on preparation for work in rural areas.

- This led to...

Comprehensive Needs Assessment

- Multiple site visits – assess care, Medical School needs
- Identify gaps in Maternal/Child Health and Public Health
- Basis for multi-year Public-Private Partnership with UPNG and NDoH

Public Private Partnership

- Memorandum of Agreement signed Oct, 2013
 - Baylor College of Medicine-Texas Children's hospital (BCM-TCH)
 - The PNG National Department of Health
 - The University of Papua New Guinea (UPNG)
 - 5 year MOA
 - Personnel on ground November, 2013
- Funding for PPP provided by ExxonMobil PNG (EMPNG) for 3 years



Goals of PPP

- **Strengthen 3 core areas:**
 - **Public Health**
 - **Maternal Health**
 - **Paediatrics**
- **Improve clinical care at Port Moresby General Hospital**
- **Fund a PNG learner for an MPH program at the University of Texas**
- **Provide lectures for medical students and residents**
- **Assistance in research programs**
- **M&E framework developed to capture pertinent data in teaching, training, improved care outcomes**

Strengthen Public Health

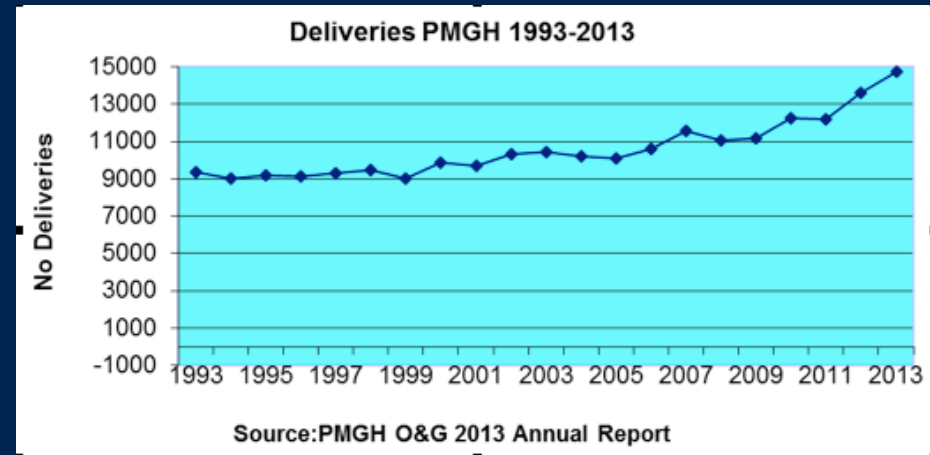
- ❑ One Baylor Faculty Public Health specialist seconded as long-term full time faculty member to UPNG
- ❑ Increased the number of faculty from 3 to 4 at the time

Role of Public Health Specialist

- ❑ Develop and teach core public health courses in Epidemiology and Biostatistics
- ❑ Research Mentorship of student projects at both undergraduate and postgraduate levels as well as short term training workshops
- ❑ Assist with the review of the medical school's curriculum for Public Health.
 - ❑ Incorporating additional measurements for academic progression

Strengthen Maternal Health – Background PNG

- Maternal Mortality ratio
 - 79 per 100,000 live births
 - PNG data 2012
 - 733 per 100,000 live births
 - WHO data

Strengthen Maternal Health – Background UPNG SMHS

- Mid-range goals (2-3 years)
 - Train 60 MBBS students each year in Reproductive Health, Obstetrics and Gynecology
 - Train 6-8 DGO candidates each year, and graduate 3-5 MMed (O&G) candidates each year

Strengthen Maternal Health

- ❑ Provide one Maternal Health specialist as long-term full time faculty member to UPNG
- ❑ Teaching at UPNG SMHS
- ❑ Clinical care at PMGH

Strengthen Child Health - Background PNG & UPNG

- The ideal # of paediatricians as per national health plan
 - Total paediatricians needed = 60
 - Current active clinical workforce = 31
 - PMGH = 8 (currently 5)
 - UPNG = 4 (currently 3 with Baylor-Texas Childrens Paediatrician)
- Shortfall = 23
- Maximum increase up to 2018 = 14
 - Predicted shortfall = between 9-17

Strengthen Child Health

- ❑ One Baylor Paediatric specialist seconded as long-term full time faculty member to UPNG
- ❑ Increases the number of faculty from 3 to 4

Role of Paediatric Specialist

- ❑ Provide academic and clinical training in child health to medical students and post-graduate students
- ❑ Clinical support as Senior Medical Officer to PMGH
 - ❑ General Paediatrics
 - ❑ Tuberculosis
 - ❑ HIV
 - ❑ Malnutrition
- ❑ Research mentorship of post-graduate students
- ❑ Assist with the review of the medical school's curriculum for Child Health
- ❑ Outreach support to Tari Hospital in collaboration with NDoH and UNICEF

Progress of Program

Education

- >120 lectures given
- >55 research projects mentored
- Training to >200 healthcare workers

Outreach

- Tari Hospital

Clinical Outcomes – From M&M



11.5	11.5	32.7

Malnutrition either directly caused or contributed to 36% of all deaths (*PHR 2)

UPNG SMHS – looking ahead

- Need for increased capacity of health workforce in PNG is acute
- Government and development partners will play a vital role
- Infrastructure development vital
- SMHS must increase its intake of medical students and other categories of health workers over next 10 years, with special emphasis on rural and provincial parts of the country
- PPP can support this vision

Future Vision of the PPP

- Long term faculty support to boost *ability* to increase the number of next generation of Faculty, available to teaching hospitals and Public Health Professionals
- Improve clinical care to maternal and child health
- MPH Scholarship: PNG public health learner will be supported for a two-year MPH program at the University of Texas School of Public Health – Houston, TX
- Additional capacity building programs currently in process (Infectious Disease Training and grants)
 - Other funding sources being sought, program expansion?
